


#### Introduction

This *mikroflööt* (estonian word for micro-flute) is a **vessel flute**. Traditional vessel flutes can be found all over the world and have existed for thousands of years.


The most famous instrument in this family is the ocarina, invented in Budrio, Italy, in the 19th century by

Giuseppe Donati. By usage, all vessel flutes are now often called ocarinas.

In the 1960s, English mathematician John Taylor proposed a 4-hole ocarina that could cover an octave using special fingerings. These are the fingerings we have chosen for our *mikroflööt*.




Four-hole English pendant ocarina


#### Playing intrucions

The micro-flute is played with one hand, either left or right. It should be held between the lips (on which it is simply rested) and the little finger, leaving the other fingers free. Before you begin, make sure your fingers cover all the holes. **Blow gently** into the mouthpiece, **pronouncing 'T'** for each note (except when you want to play slurs).

Tuning: once all the holes are closed, you just need to determine the correct blowing strength to play the G note.



#### G blues scale




These arpeggios correspond to the following chords: G - C - Am - D - B - G

<u>Note</u>: the higher the note, the harder you have to blow. The flute is ajusted so that this variation is minimal, except for the two highest notes (F# and G) in order to maintain a bright sound.




